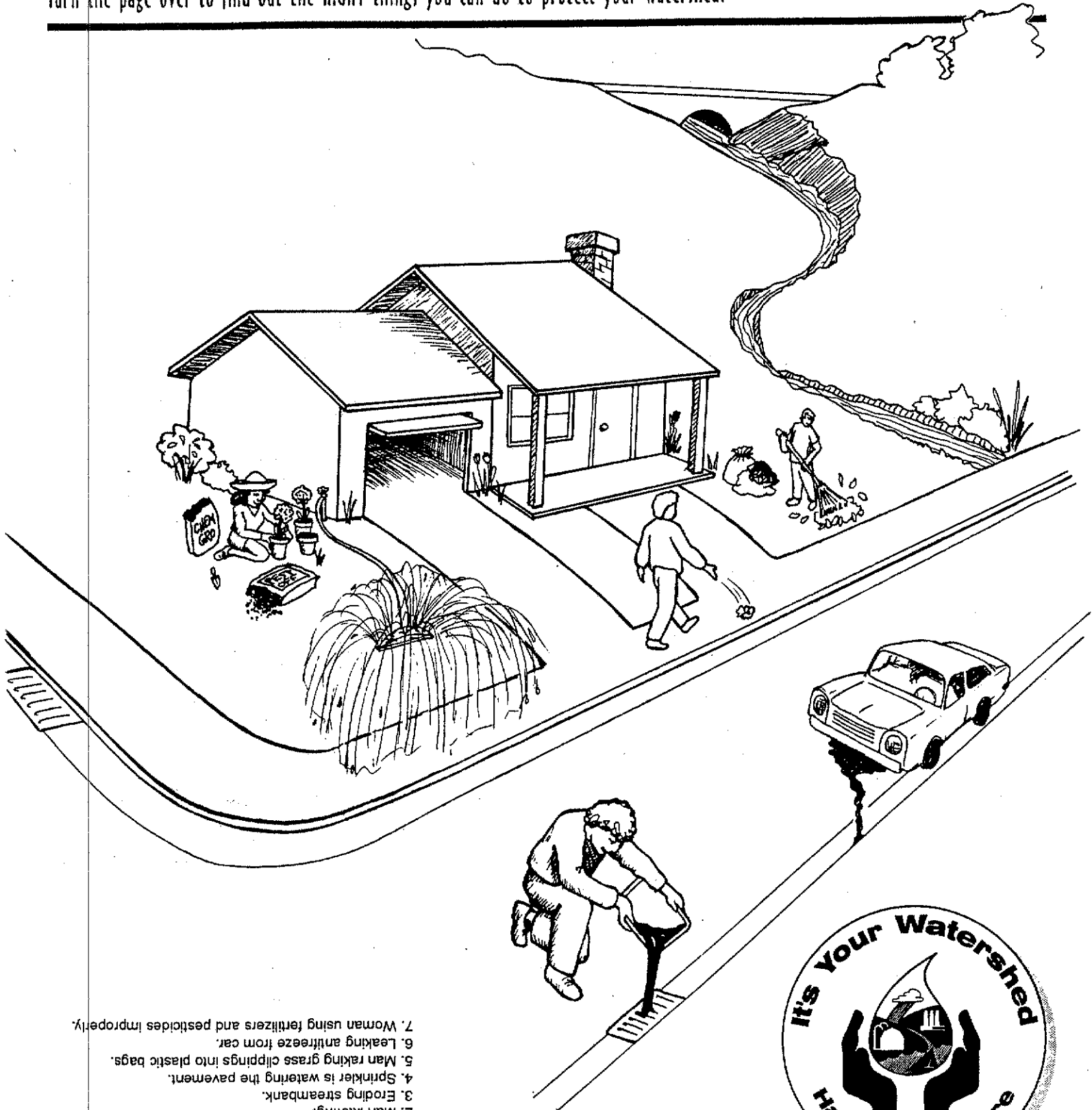


What's wrong with this picture?

Turn the page over to find out the RIGHT things you can do to protect your watershed.



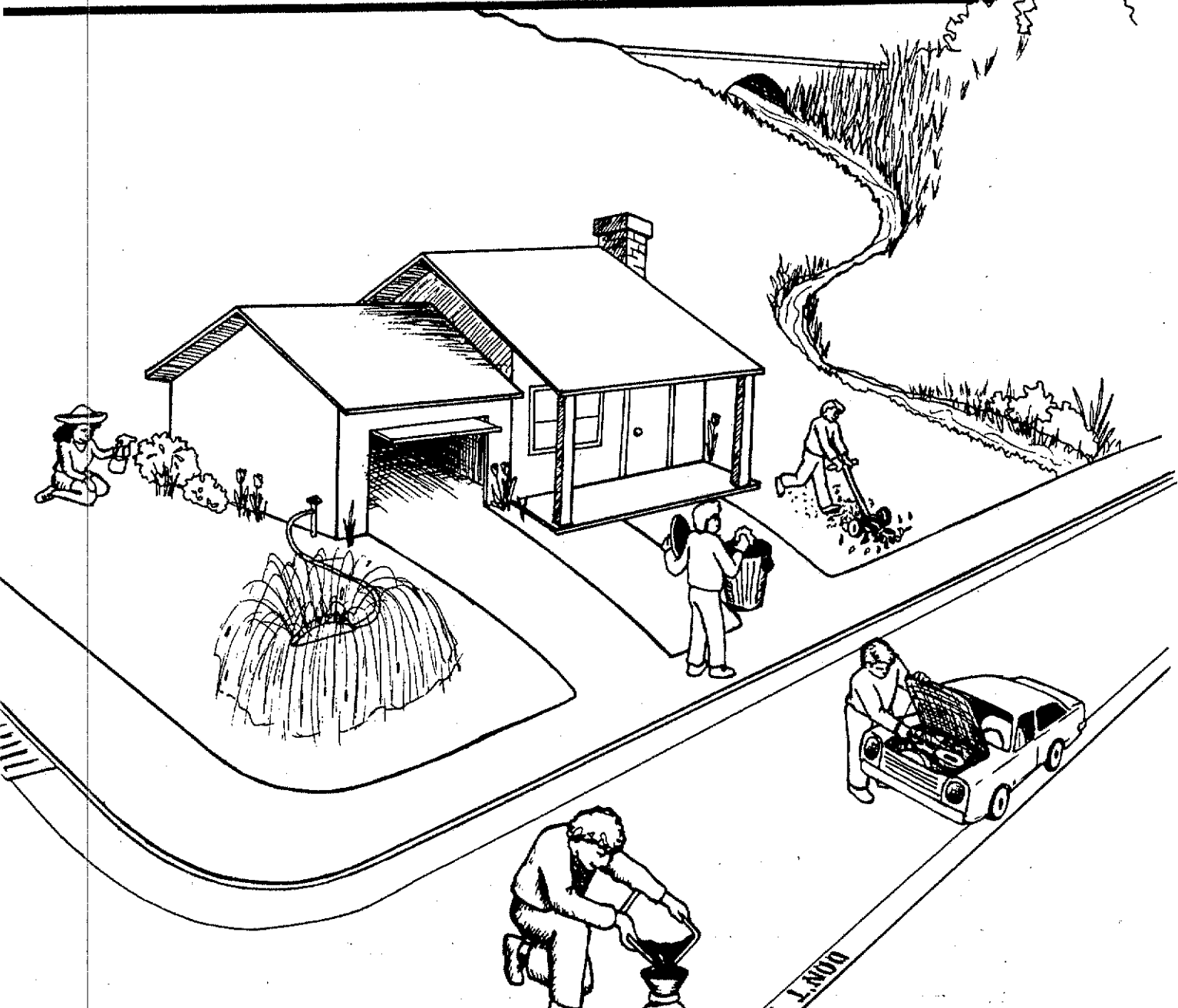
1. Man dumping motor oil down the storm drain.

- Answers:
1. Recycle used motor oil at an approved facility. Stencil "DO NOT DUMP" on the storm drain.
 2. Dispose of trash properly and recycle as much of your trash as possible.
 3. Plant trees or leave native vegetation along a stream bank to reduce erosion.
 4. Place sprinklers only on the lawn and water early in the morning to reduce evaporation.
 5. Leave mowed grass clippings on the lawn as a source of nutrients for the grass, and to reduce erosion.
 6. Check your car regularly to make sure oil and other fluids are not leaking.
 7. Use fertilizers and pesticides properly.
